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2024 ROAD WORK COMPLETE!

The Bridgeview Street Resurfacing Project continues with new road repaving to improve our infrastructure and beautify our community. Work has been completed on six streets, with a total of nearly half a mile of streets repaved. Curbs, sidewalks, and storm sewers have also been updated as needed.

- 77th St 78th Ave to Roberts Road
- 78th St 78th Ave to Sholer
- 82nd St 78th Ave to Roberts
- 81st Place Roberts Road to the cul-de-sac
- Ferdinand 82nd to 83rd Street
- Dover Willow to Southfield
- Stanford East to cul-de-sac


Trustee Gary Lewis, Chairman of the Public Works Committee, stated that, "This year's planned streets were beautifully repaved. Looking at the 'before' pictures, it's clear that the investment will make for a smoother ride through the neighborhood. Eliminating potholes and keeping our roads in top condition is important for the safety of our residents as well as our first responders who may




A view of 77th St. heading towards Roberts Rd. prior to being repaved.

Community Enjoys Free Services at Resource Fair

Local residents enthusiastically came out for Bridgeview's 2nd Annual Community Resource Fair organized in partnership with the Village of Bridgeview, Pathlights, and JourneyCare Hospice at the Bridgeview Community Center on Friday, October 25th. The three-hour fair provided free services and informational resources to all who attended helping to meet community needs and support public health. Free services included hearing and vision screenings provided by the Lions Club, glucose measuring, blood pressure testing, massages, flu and COVID-19 shots, and more. The Secretary of State's Seniors Only DMV also continued operating out of the Community Center as normal, conveniently providing DMV services to those who attended the Resource Fair.

The health services offered are valuable parts of preventive care and personal health management. A hearing screening by the Lions Club, for example, serves as a diagnostic test that tells people whether or not they would benefit from hearing aids. The COVID-19 and flu vaccines offered by the Walgreens Vaccine Clinic reduce the risk of hospitalization if the diseases are contracted, saving lives and relieving the stress on our healthcare system. The variety of services offered at no cost once again made the Bridgeview Public Services Fair an impactful community health event.

The Community Blood Center also ran a blood

drive at the event, collecting blood donations from local community members, Bridgeview employees, and other attendees to help ensure that our healthcare system has this lifesaving resource.

Bridgeview Celebrates National Public Lands Day!

In celebration of National Public Lands Day, the Village of Bridgeview, Township of Lyons, ecologist Dr. Louis Mulé of Tallgrass Associates, and local volunteers cleaned up trash, removed invasive/non-native plants, and collected native plant seeds at Bridgeview's Shooting Star Prairie bordering Harlem Avenue near 76th Street. Teams removed and bagged different plants, such as Canadian Goldenrod and Sawtooth Sunflower, under the direction of Dr. Mulé. Other teams collected seeds from native plants vital to the black soil prairie's health, including Common Milkweed, Compass Plant, Coneflower, Indian Grass, Mountain Mint, and Switchgrass.

Dr. Mulé explained the importance of the seed collection, saying "these are wild native seeds locally adapted to our area—our ecotype. Generally, they are more difficult to obtain and cost more than horticultural variants sold by growers."

Seed collection is typically done in the late summer or fall and ensures that stewards of the prairie have each major species of plant to support those native plant populations and keep them healthy. Seeds are placed into a paper bag and stored in a refrigerator, simulating winter temperatures so that the seeds will properly sprout when planted in the spring. Seed collection also provides a valuable record of what plants are thriving in the area, and volunteers interested in starting a native garden at their homes were free to take seeds to support their local environments.

The National Public Lands Day event provided a valuable educational and volunteer opportunity for Scouts from Troop 14 in La Grange as well as students from Reavis High School who attended with their environmental science teacher. Fourteen bags of seeds were collected, weighing an estimated 2.2 lbs. and providing an estimated value of \$104.78. The Village of Bridgeview appreciates the volunteers who came out to help preserve and maintain the Shooting Star Prairie.

Red Stars Shoot to Playoffs

The Chicago Red Stars are no longer underdogs after a transformative year. During the 2023 NWSL season, they ranked last place, with only 24 points. Since then, they've brought in new players, new coaches, and new management.

New athletes drafted to the team included Hannah Anderson (31st overall), Bea Franklin (41st overall), Jameese Joseph (15th overall), and Leilanni Nesbeth (10th overall). Returning to the field this season was Mallory Swanson, a starter and top scorerer for the Red Stars who was unable to play due to a knee injury that required two surgeries. The person picked to lead the new and improved team was Lorne Donaldson, former coach of the Jamaican women's national soccer team, was made head coach.

The Stars also boast a truly star-studded group of Olympic athletes, including U.S. gold medalists Alyssa Naeher and Mallory Swanson, Brazilian silver medalist Ludmila, and Canadian midfielder Julia Grosso who each competed in Paris in 2024.

On the evening of October 13th, the Chicago Red Stars, ranked #6 in the NWSL, revealed that they had clinched a spot in the 2024 NWSL playoffs! The path to the playoffs wasn't easy, but the Stars shone bright and earned their spot, proving they have what it takes to compete with the top half of the league.

Completing their 2024 transformation, the Chicago Red Stars announced on October 23rd that they were rebranding themselves as the Chicago Stars FC for the 2025 season. The new Chicago Stars crest fea-

tures homages to the six-pointed stars of the Chicago flag, Wrigley Field, the Chicago Theater, Lake Michigan, and more.




